A Star Weekend



On a recent visit to East Sussex, we stayed in the Star Inn in the picturesque village of Alfriston. Built in the 13th century it still retains many of its original features. At one time the inn was run by the monks of Battle Abbey and offered shelter to friars and pilgrims as they travelled to Chichester to visit the shrine of St Richard. The shrine, which was richly decorated, was plundered and destroyed in 1538 by order of Thomas Cromwell. Nowadays, the Star Inn has been extended at the back with modern rooms and facilities. It is on the South Downs Way, which stretches from Winchester to Eastbourne. Many of the guests staying there were walking all or part of this, just staying the one night.

In the centre of the village is the 'Tye' or village green, with St Andrew's Church on a hill behind it. It was founded in the 1360s and is large, with soaring arches and a tall spire. It has become known as 'The Cathedral on the South Downs'. Unusually the church is built in the form of a Greek cross (a cross with arms of equal length). Below the spire are six bells, with the bell ropes hanging down inside the centre of the church. This is unusual as there are less than twenty churches in the country like this. The spire was being repaired and a steeplejack was replacing the wooden shingles, as he hung from a harness.

Next to the church is the clergy house. This is a Wealden hall house built in



the 14th century and was the first built property bought by the National Trust. It was originally a farmer's house before becoming a home for the clergy. It has an interesting history and has been lovingly restored. Its small but well-planted garden is delightful and very colourful.

I really enjoyed our visit and look forward to

exploring other villages and churches in the future. I saw a postcard in the church with this quote:

'I shall pass this way but once; any good that I can show to any human being; let me do it now. Let me not defer nor neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again.'

The words made me wonder how many people have passed through these lovely old buildings. Maybe you have?

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

Calling All Knitters Again

Following on from the tremendous response we had with the knitted poppies last year and the spring flowers this year, I started wondering if there was anything else that we could knit that would be simple enough and that we could all take part in. I missed having knitting to do but not anything too complicated.

Shortly after this, on my visit to Queen Elizabeth House with a group from our church, I was impressed to see that the elderly residents were knitting squares for blankets to send out to Africa. Could we do that? We have a



special link with Kondoa and I am assured that gifts of blankets would be very welcome. Sharon from Avicraft Wool in Chatterton Road has offered us a bag of odd balls of wool to start us off. I would be happy to coordinate the project and would welcome offers of help to sew them together.

If like me you enjoyed knitting the poppies and would like to knit something simple that you can pick up from time to time... then read on.

Pattern for our Knitted Squares.

Using Double-knitting wool and size 8 (4mm) needles cast on one stitch. Knit in garter stitch, increasing one stitch at the beginning of each row until 50 stitches. Continue in garter stitch, decreasing one stitch at the beginning of each row. Using this method the square holds its shape better and it is more interesting to knit.

P.S. If you have any red wool left and would like to knit poppies again this year I'm sure we could find somewhere to display them.

I particularly liked the plaque that recorded that a local benefactor in 1169 'gave money to be paid out of his land and distributed to poor widows in bread'.


