The intention was to give people space both to spend time with God on a personal level and to seek his vision for us as a church.




Tom Manthorpe - 14 June 1928 to 23 August 2021

A walk along the Pilgrim's Way to Canterbury, had been in our 'Call to Grow plan' for some time, so it was

with great excitement that seven of our parish people met at Chilham, on a beautiful warm sunny day in July to walk the seven miles to Canterbury, following the footsteps of the Canterbury Pilgrims, who supposedly walked along this way to visit the shrine of Thomas Becket, the murdered priest, elevated to sainthood in the 12th century. The pace was steady as we climbed the hills and admired the views across the North Downs. We walked through fields of barley and flax and orchards of apples and hops. After a short stop for lunch, we journeyed on and wearily entered Canterbury, through the old city gate in the same way as the Pilgrims would have done so many years before. Like them, we came from many different backgrounds, but we walked and talked together and shared experiences.



In August we stayed closer to home, and fifteen of us took a leisurely hour and a half stroll from Norman Park, through the woodland, following the River Ravensbourne. We hope that these local walks will become a monthly occurrence, as not only do they provide gentle exercise in the company of others, but also the opportunity to reach out to a neighbour or someone you met on the Parish prayer walk and invite them to join us.

Where We've Come From

I was talking with editor, Sue Goodger, about a possible article on Hymns, but then decided to first provide some background, which may be unfamiliar to some.

As a result of the Protestant Reformation in the 16th Century, we came to have the Bible ('Authorised Version') and service book (Book of Common Prayer) in English, the spoken language of the time. These books continued in general use until the middle of the 20th Century, and dominated the language of worship, even though everyday speech was evolving into what we have today. The wording of hymns tended to be in the same style, and even at informal prayer meetings God would be addressed as 'Thou' and 'Thee'.



From the 1960s we have had new translations of the Bible, and new forms of service. In our book 'Hymns for Today's Church' (1982) the traditional hymns have been modernised. The old services are still used in cathedrals and some churches, and many churches are using the old hymns as first written.

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
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
