Easter 2022

Over the last week, we as a Church have invited our local schools, before they break for the Easter holidays, to experience what that first Easter may have felt like. The journey they took was from Palm Sunday through to Easter Day, in effect a mini version of the Passion play was put together.

We asked them to put themselves into the picture and examine what their feelings might have been as they saw Jesus entering Jerusalem. They were given palm leaves to wave and encouraged to shout "Hosanna." Next they became part of the Temple crowd as Jesus turned over the tables of the money changers. They sat at the Last Supper as Jesus celebrated his final Passover Meal, the washing of the feet, breaking bread and the betrayal by Judas. They saw his heart breaking in the garden of Gethsemane, on his knees praying to his father in heaven, and saw him standing before Pilate to receive the death sentence of crucifixion on the cross. They finished their journey beside the empty tomb, witnessing to the resurrection of Jesus. For many of the children this could possibly have been the first time they have had the chance to fully engage with what Easter is truly about. Our prayer for

them is that, as they grow, this experience will stay with them and inform their thinking and understanding of God's love reaching into this world through his son Jesus Christ.

The world we see today is marred by violence and destruction, the pain and sorrow in Ukraine is displayed on our TV screens nightly. Yet we also see love being displayed, as food, clothes and medical aid is given, and as refugees flood into neighbouring countries accommodation for families is offered freely. We know many people in this country and in our community are willing to be part of that.

For us as Christians, the Easter story is the bedrock of who and what we are. Through it we are brought into that place where we see Jesus fully human and fully divine, as he gives himself wholeheartedly as a sacrifice for our sin; and that through true repentance the world that so often seems a broken place can be different.

So, as we celebrate Easter, I pray, along with the children who journeyed along the road of Jesus's passion, that we might hold on to the hope that Jesus brings to each one of us today, that through faith in him we might find God's peace and God's love in our lives, not just at Easter but every day.


It seemed the whole service was reflecting the current situation and was all the more meaningful for that.

Give Campanology a Chance!

Stalwarts of St Augustine's; we need you!

The sound of church bells ringing out over town or country to welcome worshippers to service or to mark important State occasions is one to be treasured as part of the rich texture of life in Britain. Change ringing as we know it today was invented in this country, and practised by local bands of ringers at towers up and down the land since at least the sixteenth century.



For the congregation of St Augustine's, one of benefits of joining forces with St Luke's is access to the St Luke's bells, and all the tradition that brings with it. A gift to St Luke's, together with the fine spire that houses them, from a prominent Bromley family the Wheeler-Bennets, they are a ring of eight, cast by Taylors of Loughborough in 1910. Together with the Bromley Parish Church and St George's Bickley, St Luke's completes the 'golden triangle' of eight-bell towers in Bromley, quite a rarity in such close proximity, and of a quality much sought after by visiting bands of ringers.

But bells need ringers. Once basic bell-handling skills have been mastered, ringing is a 'team' activity requiring at least six people ringing together to learn and practise the rudiments of change ringing (the bells changing places on every stroke to describe a 'method' or 'tune'), and once mastered move on to ringing changes on 8, 10 and sometimes 12 bells together. Change ringing, as it is called, is both stimulating and fun but the ravages of lock-down, the passing of time and a dwindling congregation have between them reduced the numbers of the St Luke's Band to sub-critical levels, and the ringing you may hear on a Thursday evening or before Sunday evening services at St Luke's is generally achieved with the help of visiting ringers from neighbouring bands. We need to address this, not least to keep the skills alive for the next generation.



Which is where you come in. Like all skills requiring coordination and concentration, the earlier you start the easier it is to master. We practise on Thursday evenings, from about 7.30 - 9.15pm, but we can be flexible to accommodate different ages. Any age from ten to sixty is an ideal one at which to start, (other ages considered!) It is not physically demanding, yet wonderful therapy for the arms and shoulders, mentally stimulating, and the whole family can do it together! Though the object of learning is to ring for services, it's not all hard work. In the summer, outings to ring at groups of other towers in different parts of the country are arranged, usually attractive villages deep in the country with welcoming pubs or country rambles if the ringing palls.

Why don't you come and try, and bring a friend? Chris Lawrance (Tower Captain) and I would be very happy to 'show you the ropes' almost any Thursday evening, and then take it from there. Best to phone me or Chris first to arrange this and ensure ringing is taking place that evening.

Come on, pick up that phone!

There is much talk in the media these days about the disappearance of 'community' from our neighbourhoods. Pubs are closing, de-consecrated churches appear on Grand Designs and vegetable shops are as rare as hens' teeth. So why is our community in Bickley bucking the trend?

The Parade of shops on the Fairway has adapted slowly and maybe this is its recipe for success. The newest shop to open is also the oldest. In January when Rob and Alice took down the 'M J Painter' sign from above the butcher's shop on the corner, they came across the original one, 'Sperring'. Fifty years on, 'Cleaver and Twine' is the new name on the block - and already there is a website.

Rob is originally from Strood and trained for two years as a butcher straight from school. The prospect of running his own shop, however, seemed unaffordable, so he went back to college to study engineering instead and set up a garage doors business. It was while working in the engineering industry that, in 2018, he met Alice. They moved to Beckenham and their story during the following years is typical of that experienced by many





families. Covid hit and they decided that they could diversify

and run their own business. So, they converted their garage into a catering work area and began producing and selling sausages made from an old family recipe.

Alice is Bromley born and bred. She went to Holy Trinity College, which closed in 2005, and then to Langley Girls school. Her uncle lives in Bickley and had owned the wine shop on the Parade before converting it into Ted's café. When Rob and Alice heard that Mick Painter was retiring, they hit the ground running. They sourced new equipment, found a signwriter to construct their new 'Cleaver and Twine' board and have even found an original 1950s butcher's artefact. Their own obsession is antique fairs and boot sales and Alice's prize possession are three Venetian puppets. Now that the shop is open, keep your eyes out for 'Mick, the puppet butcher'. We wish them well in their new venture.
