Time for some 'Holy Habits'

In March we are in the Christian season of Lent, forty weekdays when we commemorate Jesus going into the wilderness of Judea for a time of fasting and testing in preparation for his ministry. For Christians, it can be a time of reflection; where we think about our Christian journey. Although through history it has been seen as a time for abstinence, it's not simply a time to give up chocolate or alcohol. It can be a good time for a spiritual 'check-up'. As it says on our website, 'Christianity isn't about giving up on fun, pleasure or success. Jesus came to help us live life to the full but that can only be done when we model our lives on him and allow him to give us his peace, grace and Holy Spirit'.



We, in St Augustine's with St Luke's, want to deepen our faith in Jesus and our relationships with others. Some of us are enjoying special daily readings during this time. In our Lent groups we are exploring some 'Holy Habits'. These have been developed as a helpful way of life for both those exploring or already actively living out the call of Jesus to 'follow me'. They are for all ages and cultures; a way of life based on Luke's portrait of the community of followers of Jesus that we see in Acts 2:42–47; habits that are as blessing to all; that help us to grow as disciples of Jesus.

There are ten habits: biblical teaching, meeting together (fellowship), attending communion, prayer, sharing resources, serving, eating together, gladness and generosity, worship and making more disciples. The habits can become a way of life for young and old in the church community. When lived faithfully day by day, the habits encourage us together in the adventure of following Jesus. There have been lots of stories from people who have found these to be an encouragement; bringing peace, lessening anxiety, and building community. May this time of Lent encourage us to think about adopting new habits on our faith journey that will encourage us but then also allow us to be a blessing to our community.



'Cry in the Dark' in Ukraine



'Cry in the Dark' has been working in Romania for over 20 years helping and caring for children, many who had been orphans living in appalling conditions and have special needs. They founded a home for the orphans, and also a centre which currently houses volunteers. This was formerly a medical centre for terminal children's palliative and respite care, until they opened a brand new paediatric inpatient unit a few years ago. Throughout last year the centre was also home to several families of Ukrainian refugees from Odessa.

With his wealth of experience, Steve Cooper, the CEO of the charity drove into Ukraine from Romania at the end of January on a fact-finding mission, accompanied by Mihaela Dumtrache and Dr Lou Chanarin. There they visited several orphanages to donate resources and to find out exactly what their needs are and how to help them. He has now returned home safely and thanks all those who have been praying for them and those who have donated to their charity. Their task now is to plan the best way to help the many children who have been displaced by the war and are orphans.

My Friend Gisela

I first met Gisela Kerkmann in September 1959 when a group from St. Augustine's visited Foxbury, the then CMS training college in Chislehurst, prior to a CMS led mission the following Spring. When the team

from Foxbury and Liskeard Lodge came in April, Gisela and I 'gelled' together, and during the mission week, won a treasure hunt!



Originally from Germany Gisela had come to England after the war and acquired British citizenship while training as a nurse in Derbyshire. She stayed with friend June Mercer during the mission and we both saw her off to India in late 1960, keeping in touch after she reached Pachod Hospital in Western India. At our request she became our church's 'missionary link' for the next twenty years, during which time we raised funds and sent equipment to the hospital. As she had no particular base in England, she stayed with June whenever she came home on furlough.

Around 1970, she moved across to Hiranpur hospital in Eastern India. In 1977 Joan Kemp, then the instigator of a CMS 'Action Group' at St.

Augustine's, organised a trip to India for June, Joan and me. An overnight train trip took us to Hiranpur to be met by Gisela and spend some days at the hospital with her. We saw much of Indian hospital and local Christian church life, including a baptism. On leaving Hiranpur Gisela insisted that we experience second class train travel to Calcutta, a real eye-opener into local means of travel.

We next travelled across India by train to Poona where June, Joan and I spent some days at Sangam, an International Guide House, while Gisela stayed at a mission house. Our trip ended in Bombay, where Gisela took us to Elephant Island with its many statues. As it was now December, our trip ended with a Christian Carol Service on the beach.

Gisela returned to England in 1980, ending her working career in Homefield, Bermondsey Medical Mission home. She then met Alfred Jeffery, a keen mission supporter from Crowborough, and they were married at St. Augustine's. She had also become our Pastoral Assistant. As they now lived in Addison Road next door to St. Luke's, the vicar there 'poached' them to assist at that church, which needed more help at the time. In 2002 they retired to Cliftonville, near Margate, where I stayed with them on a couple of occasions, including one Christmas. Their final move was to a beautifully equipped retirement flat near the sea front, where I last visited them a couple of years before the Covid lockdown. Sadly their health declined as they both reached their nineties. Having fallen and broken her femur, Gisela finally went to be with the Lord she loved and had so faithfully served, on 28th January. Our thoughts and prayers are with Alfred at this time, as he bravely copes with his loss.

I have always loved knowing Gisela, who as well as being full of faith, was also full of fun, and we spent many happy times together. Long may we remember her.


Mirror, Mirror on the Wall
